



Samoset Council 2022 Annual Report

We are pleased to share with you the 2022 Council Annual Report.

Our camping program remains the signature of Samoset Council and 2022 saw no change in this promise as we grew in youth participants by 15%, serving over 4,800 campers in our summer programs.

Samoset continues to offer the best programs in the nation through Crystal Lake Scout Reservation and our programs at Camp Tesomas Scouts BSA Camp and Akela's World Cub Scout Camp. We are able to serve not only our own council members, but also youth and adults from many other states.

The number of new youth members joining Scouting in Samoset increased over the previous year. We achieved 1.5% youth membership growth, including 7.7% in Cub Scouts. In the fall of 2022, 492 new youth were recruited — a 21% increase over fall of 2021!

Service remains a core tenet of Scouting. In addition to over 9,500 hours of community service performed by 69 Eagle Scouts through their Eagle Service Projects, we also partnered with local food banks in our annual Scouting for Food Service Project. Over 1,000 Scouts, Parents and Leaders participated. As a result, over 42,000 pounds of food were collected and given to those in need.

All of these successes and more were made possible through the generous gifts of time, talent, and treasure of thousands of volunteers and donors. Because of your support and commitment to Scouting, we continue to be a leader in youth development in the North Central Wisconsin area.

Thank you for helping transform today's youth into tomorrow's leaders.

Early in Jacob's 5th grade year, he came home with a bracelet on his wrist. He told his dad, Wayne, and I, how he didn't want to go to music class, so he went to a Scout meeting instead.

At which point, he received a wristband with a date and time for the first Scout meeting of the year. He wanted to go because the nice gentleman at the meeting talked about camping. We kindly reminded Jacob that we camp all the time, "Yes, but this will be fun!" Jacob said.

Wayne took the opportunity to share all the memories from his Scouting years with his son and how it is more than camping. And with that, Jacob's Scouting journey started.

Webelos came and went quickly. Jacob crossed over to Troop 187. His first summer camp in 2018 at Camp Tesomas captured his heart and soul, as anyone who has been there can understand.

Fast forward to the summer of 2021, all he talked about after another week at camp, was how he wanted to be a Counselor in Training (CIT) the next summer. He wanted to spend the whole summer at camp. Jacob applied, interviewed, and later was asked to be a CIT for summer 2022.

Additionally, Jacob attended National Youth Leadership Training the week before summer camp started. We heard, he will come back changed, and he certainly did! Picking him up after a week in the woods, it was obvious he had learned so much. A trained leader, ready to take on the new role of CIT at camp.

Jacob has always been the quiet, kind, and helpful type. Never getting in the middle of confrontations. Samoset Council, BSA and all the opportunities, have given Jacob the confidence in his leadership and will continue to strengthen his character into adulthood.

69 Eagle Scout Awards – Scouts BSA highest award! Only 4% of all Scout youth achieve Eagle rank. It demonstrates the pinnacle of leadership achievement in which a Scout must plan a community service project that makes the community a better place to live.

Cub Scouts 1,370 youth

This family program serves boys and girls ages 5 – 10 developing self-esteem, teaching cooperation, values, and unity.

Scouts BSA 795 youth

This outdoor program serves young men and women ages 11 – 18 focusing on leadership and character development while instilling the value of service to others.

Venturing 22 youth

A program for young men and women ages 14 – 20 using high adventure to provide positive experiences that help youth mature and grow into responsible adults.

Exploring 9 youth

A worksite-based program for young men and women ages 14 - 20 exposing youth to community businesses, organizations, and careers.

Outreach Programs

Over \$73,000 in financial aid and scholarships were provided to positively impact all youth and families in our council. The council awarded \$33,000 in college scholarships, \$14,000 in membership financial assistance, and \$26,000 in camp financial assistance for youth to have an outdoor adventure experience.

Served 474 community youth through day camps and outreach programs throughout North Central Wisconsin, providing assistance to ensure that every youth and adult who wanted to participate in Scouting could do so regardless of their financial, economic, or geographic status.

Camping & Facilities

4,826 Campers

In the Samoset Council, our slogan is "Where Camping is King!" We are proud of our outdoor programs and facilities used to help deliver the Scouting program.

Crystal Lake Scout Reservation

A 1,000+-acre property consisting of three program camps located near Rhinelander, WI.

- Tesomas Scout Camp –Weeklong summer camp experiences for Scouts BSA youth.
- Akela's World Cub Scout Camp – Offering camp programs for Cub Scouts
- Hanna Venture Base – Offering a variety of High Adventure programs for older youth.

Phillips Scout Camp

A 78-acre property in Weston, WI, our Phillips camp is used for short-term camping and training activities.

Flambeau Canoe Base

Located west of Phillips, WI, on the south fork of the Flambeau River, our canoe base provides biking and hiking trails, campsites, and canoes to rent.

Wausau Homes Scout Service Center

Located next to Camp Phillips in Weston, WI, our council service center is our administrative hub (membership, finance, field service, program, and customer service) that serves the entire council and houses our Scout Shop where you can find advancement, recognition, and outdoor camping items.

Scouting Safely

Our Guide to Safe Scouting and youth protection practices and policies are updated on a consistent basis to keep all participants safe.

Our commitment to youth safety is paramount above all else. Scouting has developed some of the strongest expert-informed safety policies found in any youth-serving organization.
