



## HOW TO PUBLICIZE YOUR UNIT

Scouting is one of the most well-recognized “brands” in America. The problem is: just because someone recognizes our logo or a Scout in uniform does not do much to convince them to join. In a world of so many opportunities and choices for families and their children, it is up to all of us to provide information about how those families can join Scouting and why those families should join Scouting. Here are a few ways to do that:

### Unit Web page

It may not seem revolutionary, but a simple, up-to-date website can go a long way to helping families find your unit and decide whether it’s a good fit. A search for “best free website builder 2021” will provide you with a good starting point. No matter which platform you choose, you really ought to do the following:

- Include a calendar.
- Keep it updated
- Add your website URL to BeAScout.org – BeAScout is the Boy Scouts of America’s platform for people to search for Scouting programs near their home. Along with your unit leader’s contact information, your website URL will help these families find all the information you want them to know.

### Social media


The social media world can change quickly, but for now, nothing matches Facebook’s ability to support a unit’s needs. You can schedule events, share photos from recent adventures, post a poll to vote on the next trip destination, stream live videos of courts of honor, answer parents’ questions, and much more. You can also use Facebook posts to direct people to information you want them to find on your unit website. You can find videos, images, and other graphics that might come in handy for your social posts by visiting BSA’s Brand Center:

### Media outreach

Scouting needs families to read/watch stories about all the great things Scouts and Scout units are doing, whether it’s something fun or something that’s helping the community. People will join groups with which they feel comfortable – groups that they feel they know. One way many of these people can learn about Scouting is by all of us telling them about it through the local media in your community.

Believe it or not, “the media” loves positive stories. Unfortunately, it’s much easier to find negative news. But if we provide easily accessible, positive stories... the press will grab them. You can visit the local news stations websites and they have an option to share stories through email with their news reporters. You can also visit local newspaper websites to share your Scouting story and they will more than likely respond and ask for more information.





**S = Supervision:** Youth are supervised by qualified and trustworthy adults who set the example for safety.

- Three youth went on a backcountry trek without adult supervision. One teenage Scout died of heat-stroke.
- A 12-year-old Scout was alone in a dug-out sand dune that collapsed on him. He died later that day.

Scouting policies like two-deep leadership and the buddy system safeguard against tragedies like these.

**A = Assessment:** Activities are assessed for risks during planning. Leaders have reviewed applicable program guidance or standards and have verified the activity is not prohibited. Risk avoidance or mitigation is incorporated into the activity.

- Two Scouts were burned while lighting a homemade stove. They had made the stove out of a soda can and were trying to fuel it with HEET®, a liquid fuel additive. The use of homemade stoves is prohibited.
- A Webelos Scout slipped and fell 25 feet into a ravine while hiking with older Scouts who were exploring an unpaved trail. The boy hit his head on rocks and suffered severe brain trauma. He was airlifted to a local hospital and never regained consciousness.

Understanding and following the guidelines contained in program materials and the Guide to Safe Scouting helps keep all youth safer in our programs.

**F = Fitness and Skill:** Participants' Annual Health and Medical Records are reviewed, and leaders have confirmed that prerequisite fitness and skill levels exist for participants to take part safely.

- An 18-year-old assistant Scoutmaster, who had recently tested as a beginner swimmer during summer camp, drowned while attempting to swim across a river with two younger Scouts on a unit outing.
- A 38-year-old Webelos parent suffered a fatal heart attack during an overnight backpacking trip with his son's den. The parent had been denied participation in a similar hiking activity due to poor physical condition and a body mass index greater than 40.

Fitness is an aim of Scouting. Knowing who can and should participate in a particular activity — by having the necessary fitness and skill to do so — keeps youth and adults SAFE.

**E = Equipment and Environment:** Safe and appropriately sized equipment, courses, camps, campsites, trails, or playing fields are used properly. Leaders periodically check gear use and the environment for changing conditions that could affect safety.

- A 13-year-old Scout fell about 20 feet from a zip line at a commercial rock gym facility and landed on his feet, injuring his left foot. Witnesses say the youth was seen using the zip line without properly fastening the restraining carabiner.
- Three Scouts were sitting on a picnic table under a metal carport during a severe thunderstorm when they were struck by lightning. A safe building during a storm is one that is fully enclosed with a roof, walls, floor, plumbing, and wiring.

"Be Prepared" is not just a motto but a method to follow to be safe. Using the right equipment for the right activity and in the proper location keeps Scouting SAFE.

## YOUTH PROTECTION TRAINING

Protecting our youth is Scouting's top priority. Scouts BSA strives for excellence in ensuring that the safety of the youth in our program is paramount. All employees and volunteers within the organization are required to successfully complete our online youth protection training, which can be found on [my.scouting.org](https://my.scouting.org). This training must be renewed every two years, so be sure to keep yours up to date! The training is necessary to become a registered adult leader with Scouting. In addition, adult leaders undergo a criminal background check administered by a nationally recognized third party. We also enforce the two deep leadership policy which requires that all interactions with youth, including digital conversation, are from two separate adults at a time. Our barriers to abuse also state that: "One-on-one contact between adult leaders and youth members is prohibited both inside and outside of Scouting." This, like many of the other guidelines, is a policy meant to protect both our youth and our adults while upholding our values both in and out of the Scouting world. ## WOOD BADGE

**August 27-19 & September 18-19**

Wood Badge is an advanced leadership course available only to Scouters that is designed to strengthen the skills of unit leaders to better deliver the mission of Scouting. This training is on par with corporate-level workshops and will deliver you the skills to build stronger units. You can expect to develop knowledge in project planning, conflict management, mentoring, leading change and more! This course is for Scouters at all levels of the program and will help you understand more about what Scouting is and why we do it. The presentations include a mix of games, activities, demonstrations, and engaged conversation, along with other methods of delivery. Outside of having fun, building experience, and networking with fellow leaders, you will ultimately get to think about the practice of Scouting, and live together in the spirit of the Scout Oath. A recent participant of our course had this to say: "I have had many leadership training courses in my professional life. This, by far, is the best. It is brilliantly conceived and well executed."

This year the course will be held August 27-29 & September 18-19, 2021 at Akela's World Cub Scout Camp in Rhinelander. Scholarships are available for this course through the campership form located on the Samoset site under the resources tab in the forms and documents dropdown. Wood Badge is a fun experience like no other and we hope to see you there!

## FLAMBEAU CANOE BASE

Nestled deep in the Northwood's, just a few miles west of Phillips, is the Samoset Council's, 150-acre Flambeau Canoe Base. Located on the south fork of the Flambeau River, this facility has individual patrol camp sites, plus several troop camp sites, two modern outdoor latrines, a covered shelter, and campfire area.

For spring through fall use, there are 6 canoes on a trailer with helmets, paddles, and personal floatation devices for rent. Units can put in and take out wherever they want. Many units rent these canoes and take them to other rivers throughout the area.

## MICROTREK

After a confusing summer in the year 2020 MicroTrek took a major hit and was a program that didn't really exist due to health and safety. This year in 2021, MicroTrek is back and better than ever! A program that is directed toward the older Scouts that no longer have merit badges to work on is jammed pack with the best activities that Tesomas has to offer.

Scouts enrolled in MicroTrek have exclusive opportunities at the waterfront, COPE & climbing, shooting sports, and the Scouts 16+, an ATV program.

We run 2 different groups of MicroTrek, 101 and 200, with 101 being recommended for Scouts age 14-15 and 200 for Scouts 16 and older. Whichever one they take, the Scouts are guaranteed to have an incredible experience at some of the key areas that make Tesomas great.



## ECOLOGY & CONSERVATION

A key area that Scouts really enjoy when at Camp Tesomas is our Ecology & Conservation program. Over the past few years, the Ecology program has received a great improvement thanks to our friends at the Tesomas Conservation Foundation for their generous contributions to our Ecology area.

The Ecology area offers more variety in merit badges than any of the other areas at camp and has plenty of resources and visual aids for the Scouts to go through. We also take care of multiple animals at Ecology and as it stands right now, the area is currently housing 3 snakes and 2 turtles!
